Help is a call away!

The YWCA of Niagara continues to take the lead in offering alternative to domestic violence programs.

The agency offers:

- **24-hour Crisis Hotline.** A trained YWCA of Niagara staff member answers the call and provides crisis counseling, emotional support, information about domestic violence and referral to other resources. The hotline number is 716-433-6716.
- **A safe home.** The YWCA of Niagara offers emergency housing for domestic violence victims and their children.
- **Advocacy program.** Trained YWCA of Niagara staff can assist victims through the family court, criminal court and police processes.
- **Counseling program.** The YWCA of Niagara offers individual counseling and an educational support group. These programs help women consider alternatives and solutions.
- **Children's group.** The YWCA offers a therapeutic support group for children who have witnessed domestic violence.
- **Community outreach program.** The YWCA of Niagara consistently provides the community with education, training and information about domestic violence.

YWCA now handling county-wide sexual assault services

In August 2009, the YWCA of Niagara added Niagara County Rape and Sexual Assault services to its comprehensive services to women and girls.

This program was previously offered by the Niagara County Office of Mental Health which continues to partner with the YWCA and the New York State Department of Health and Department of Criminal Justice Services.

"Given our decades-long history of service to victims of domestic violence, coupled with our mission to empower women, we strongly believe that it was appropriate and consistent with our role in the Greater Niagara County community to take on the role of Rape and Sexual Assault victim's service provider," stated YWCA of Niagara CEO Kathleen Granchelli.

The added victim's service program is multifaceted. The YWCA currently has nine trained

confidential victim advocates on staff who may respond to any hospital emergency room in Niagara County when a rape victim presents in need of treatment.

The advocates will assist a victim from the moment they request assistance, whether the initial meeting is in the hospital or police station. If a victim chooses to file criminal charges, an advocate will provide advocacy and assistance through the entire criminal justice process. Individual counseling is also provided to victims through this new service.

In addition to victim service,

trained staff are committed to providing preventive education to schools, universities and community groups upon request.

This year marks the fifth anniversary of this successful housing program and the YWCA of Niagara is currently planning a celebration fitting for this milestone.

Carolyn's House provides transitional, supportive housing services to homeless women and children. Support services include an on-site culinary arts training program, GED and job readiness, Certified Nursing Assistant training, life skills programs that include parenting, domestic violence counseling, anger management, financial literacy and job opportunities for qualified residents and under-employed women with the YWCA of Niagara's full

service catering business, The Catering Crew.

The need for this type of housing is evident in the number of women and children who have been assisted by the program.

The program was named in honor of the late Carolyn Van Schaik, a Niagara Falls community activist with a passion for the city of Niagara Falls and its preservation.

Catering Crew takes off at new airport

The Catering Crew, the full-service catering business operated by the YWCA of Niagara at Carolyn's House, now runs a food service café at the new Niagara Falls International Airport.

The Catering Crew Café opened for business at the new airport on Dec. 18 and services up to 10 flights a week with more anticipated to be added to the flight schedule. Flights are destined for Punta Gorda and Melbourne, Fla., and Myrtle Beach, South Carolina.

Food service by The Catering Crew began at the old airport terminal in September and moved into the new facility once it opened for business.

This is a great opportunity provided by the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority. The social enterprise business, which was established as a way to support the on-site culinary arts program at Carolyn's House, employs residents and non-resident women who have gone through the culinary training at the Sixth Street location.

That 16-week vocational course, ini-

tially funded by the John R. Oishei Foundation, trains women for entry-level work at food service and hospitality businesses.

The John R. Oishei Foundation also provided a three-year start up grant for The Catering

Crew, which is in its second year of operation, said YWCA of Niagara CEO Kathleen Granchelli.

Guess what they did? Apparel company donates \$20,000

It started with a phone call from out of the blue.

Sue Wolfe, a Guess Inc. Regional manager for the Northeast Region, was looking for an organization that assisted children. She used Google and found Carolyn's House.

Sue and her associates wanted to find a way to increase an initial donation and after collaborating with the Carolyn's House staff, she and her crew decided to host a chicken barbeque at Carolyn's House. They coordinated a tent, bought and brought all the chicken and fixings—including the grill!

The crew served more than 160 dinners—specializing in curbside service on a rainy July morning—growing the initial donation to a total of nearly \$4,000. In addition, Sue and the employees donated numerous boxes of clothing, school supplies and household products.

Months later, Sue and many of the

same employees attended a corporate meeting in Las Vegas and told the story of Carolyn's House. The Guess owners, brothers Maurice and Paul Marciano, decided to donate \$10,000 each to the YWCA of Niagara program.

Sue and employees of her district came to a monthly luncheon at Carolyn's House and presented the \$20,000 check.

"We are certainly excited about the fact that Guess employees have decided to invest in Carolyn's House," said Kathleen Granchelli, YWCA of Niagara CEO. "It's even more gratifying when employees of an organization or company value your mission."

The generosity of this impressive group of people didn't end there. The Guess employees also bought and sent Christmas gifts to each resident and child. The YWCA of Niagara is grateful for this growing relationship with the Guess family.

New program helping to help homeless at Carolyn's House

A new re-housing program to assist homeless families or families in danger of becoming homeless in Niagara Falls with financial and case management assistance is now operating out of Carolyn's House.

"Using stimulus funds to help prevent homelessness is an idea who's time has come," said Kathleen Granchelli, CEO, YWCA of Niagara.

The Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) is funded through federal stimulus dollars and is a collaboration of agencies that include the City of Niagara Falls and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

(HUD), YWCA of Niagara, Community Missions, Neighborhood Legal Services and Niagara Falls Legal Aid Society Inc. and is available to families and individuals in Niagara Falls who meet the following criteria:

- Homeless or at risk of being homeless with no appropriate subsequent housing options and lacking the financial resources and support networks needed to obtain immediate replacement housing or to remain in existing housing;
- Having very low income;
- Niagara Falls resident

Financial assistance includes short-term rental assistance and arrears, medium-term rental assistance, security deposits, utility deposits, payments and arrears, moving and storage cost assistance, motel or hotel vouchers.

The housing relocation and stabilization services include case management.

Jane Killewald has been hired as the case manager. Her office is located at Carolyn's House where she meets with individuals to determine if they can be assisted by the program.

Camps scheduled to run in Lockport and Niagara Falls

The YWCA of Niagara will once again be offering employment opportunities to local college students through the Grigg-Lewis Internship program.

Opportunities are open to any Niagara County resident currently attending college or seeking to begin college in the fall. The internships offer a chance to sample the working environment while getting paid.

The YWCA will be offering two Grigg-Lewis positions within its summer day camps. The first, a 35-hour a week sports and recreation director, will offer the student an opportunity to work with children and teach them recreation activities and

good sportsmanship. The student will implement a sports program which reaches out to all campers regardless of their athletic abilities and help instill a positive sense of accomplishment.

The second position is a dramatic arts counselor. This student will implement a dramatic arts program to provide campers with an overview of basic drama/musical skills. Instruction and fun rather than perfection will be the focus. The position is 35 hours a week. This will be a new program to the Lockport camp.

The camp will also be in need of qualified lifeguards in Lockport and Niagara

Falls. Applicants must be 18 years old and possess current lifeguard certifications. Advanced certifications in water safety instruction are also needed.

Camps are held at Niagara Street Elementary School in Niagara Falls, 2513 Niagara St., Niagara Falls. The Lockport camp will be held at a location to be announced at a later time.

Camps will include a variety of activities, recreation, arts and crafts and Friday field trips to spots throughout Western New York and Canada.

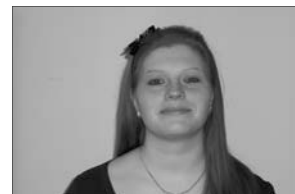

DID YOU KNOW?

- **One in every four women** will experience domestic violence in her lifetime.
- An estimated 1.3 million women are victims of physical assault by an intimate partner each year.
- 85% of domestic violence victims are women.
- Historically, females have been most often victimized by someone they knew.
- Females who are **20-24 years of age** are at the greatest risk of nonfatal intimate partner violence.
- Most cases of domestic violence are never reported to the police.

HOMICIDE AND INJURY

- Almost **one-third of female homicide victims** that are reported in police records are killed by an intimate partner.
- In 70-80% of intimate partner homicides, no matter which partner was killed, the man physically abused the woman before the murder.
- Less than one-fifth of victims reporting an injury from intimate partner violence sought medical treatment following the injury.
- Intimate partner violence results in more than **18.5 million mental health care visits** each year.¹⁶ The cost of intimate partner violence **exceeds \$5.8 billion each year**, \$4.1 billion of which is for direct medical and mental health services.
